- May Cleanup team to Glenwood, IA (Missouri River flooding)
- June Chainsaw teams to Flint community and Circle Ranch
- July Cleanup team to Hardin, IL (Mississippi and Illinois River flooding)
- August Help check out new State Feeding Unit in Prattville, AL

English and More Annual Report October 2018- September 2019

Our ESL groups looked differently this past year due to some challenges that life threw our way. The English and More students traveled to the Somerville Senior Citizen Center to have class and to do some activities with the senior adults attending. We began doing this because one of our students could not come to Decatur for class. Her husband still went to the center during the week for meals but had health issues that didn't allow him to be left alone. This setting gave our students more interaction time with English speakers. Social media has allowed us to remain in touch with students during the summer months when we did not meet.

Our Friday morning Bible study group met throughout the school year. Some American ladies who were not able to go to church on Sundays due to work, joined our group. It was a great experience for all those involved. We did not meet during the summer, but plan to start off the new school year with lunch at a local restaurant and resume Bible study the following week in September.

Some of our former ESL students from previous years left the US to return home or to settle in other countries with their husbands' jobs but have come back to the States to live. One Japanese student came to South Carolina but has since moved to Ohio. God strategically placed one of our former ESL teachers in South Carolina who renewed their friendship and started a Bible study with the student. Attempts have been made to help connect the student with someone who could help with her transition to Ohio. A French student and her family arrived in Atlanta, Georgia in August and plan to be there for one year. Several emails have been exchanged in hopes to be able to plan times that we can get together.

During the school year, I was able to go to Austinville Elementary School to tutor several Hispanic 1st graders. I have been talking to one of the ESL teachers who travels to four different elementary schools. We are trying to arrange for folks to assist some of the students that she works with. Hopefully, this will open some doors to discovering parents who might be interested in improving their English skills as well.

Alison Blackwood has been working with a Chinese lady this past year and hopes to continue lessons once she works out a schedule with her new job.

Doris Bueto continues to teach two Chinese students one morning a week in a local restaurant.
